



Second Grade Henri Rousseau Jungles

Wow! Second grade painted vibrant jungle scenes! We studied the French artist Henri Rousseau. He lived from 1844-1910, and was fascinated with the high tech things of the time (the Eiffel Tower, Zeppelins and hot air balloons, and airplanes) and the wildness of jungles! Even though he never visited the jungle, he learned and drew from observation by visiting natural history museums and greenhouses.

We learned advanced color theory by mixing a variety of greens. We used compliments, tertiary colors, and tints and shades to make brownish green, blue-green, yellow-green, and light and dark green as well as many others. Then, like Henri Rousseau, we had a variety of green to include in our compositions! We also used the artistic principle of repetition to unify our work. (Henri loved repeating orange circles in his works.)

We started by using a wash-like technique for the background. We included far-away trees in the middle ground. Lastly we painted a layer of animals in the foreground. They might be hiding! We learned a lot about good painting habits. We also learned two brush strokes that are very different techniques. Some of us tried double-loading the brush for an interesting effect. These jungles look AMAZING!!
